Their simplicity was offended by the use of oaths, by the pomp of magistracy, and by the active contention of public life; nor could their humane ignorance be convinced that it was lawful on any occasion to shed the blood of our fellow-creatures, either by the sword of justice, or by that of war... they cheerfully submitted to the authority of their Pagan governors. But while they inculcated the maxims of passive obedience, they refused to take any active part in the civil administration or the military defence of the empire...it was impossible that the Christians, without renouncing a more sacred duty, could assume the character of soldiers, of magistrates, or of princes.

This indolent, or even criminal disregard to the public welfare, exposed them to the contempt and reproaches of the Pagans who very frequently asked, what must be the fate of the empire, attacked on every side by the barbarians, if all mankind should adopt the pusillanimous sentiments of the new sect. To this insulting question the Christian apologists returned obscure and ambiguous answers, as they were unwilling to reveal the secret cause of their security; the expectation that, before the conversion of mankind was accomplished, war, government, the Roman empire, and the world itself, would be no more.

The Sojourner Principle

If we were journeying in the country of Brazil, for example, even for a lengthy period, we would find that by definition of being a sojourner in that country we would hold a special status to the extent that:

- 1. We could not vote in any public election.
- 2. We could not run for political office.
- 3. We would be subject to the laws of the land, but we could not hold an office in the judiciary.
- 4. We could not be called upon for jury duty.
- 5. We could call for a policeman, but we could not be a policeman
- If war broke out while we were there, we could not be called upon to fight.

If we were a citizen of Brazil, the very opposite to the above list would be true.

Thus in a sense we have a qualified dual citizenship. The higher heavenly citizenship is ours by choice, while the lower worldly citizenship is, as it were, thrust upon us. We believe that we must, at all cost, remain true to our heavenly citizenship at the expense of our earthly citizenship and at the expense, if necessary, of personal comfort and even life itself.
